

RECORD OF PROCEEDINGS
MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE
SHERWOOD VILLAGE COUNCIL
MAY 20, 2026

The Council for the Village of Sherwood met in regular session at 6:00 p.m. on Wednesday, May 20, 2026, in the Community Room. Mayor Dave Weaner called the meeting to order. Council Members Jim Hohenberger, Robert Valle, Jamie Vogelsong, Scott Rohrs, Mike Sudholtz, and Alex Buchhop were present; Administrator/Fiscal Officer Sherri Ramey, and Billing Clerk Faye Escalera were also present.

Committee Reports

Fire-

R. Valle said that he would like to get the Fire Board together with Chief Rock and Isaac Ankney from the Delaware Twp. Fire department to discuss getting the two departments together again. Mayor Weaner said that Chief Rock and himself have been paying attention to discussions about what to do about shared expenses and equipment. The Fire Board consists of J. Hohenberger, M. Sudholtz, and A. Buchhop.

Zoning-

The nuisance on Rock St has been abated. Pictures and the detailed list of nuisance violations for 204 S Harrison St have been forwarded to the village’s solicitor. The solicitor also sent out letters to 215 E Elm St and 225 E Elm Street. A letter will need to be sent to a property on Maple Street. J. Vogelsong said that she has heard complaints about the blue double-wide trailer on Vine Street. She stated that supposedly there are people living in the shed and in the camper that is located at the back of the property.

CITIZENS

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R. Valle said that he would like to have a carport put in for his bus. He said the issue is that since his property is on a corner lot, the required setbacks would not accommodate the carport. He asked if he could get a variance on that. He would like to remove all the gravel and replace it with a nicer driveway. He said that he can wait until Zoning Inspector G. Montez has a chance to come and look at it.

SHERIFF'S REPORT

Sheriff Deputy Alex Jackson joined the meeting and told the council that there were five EMS runs within the village, forty-nine business checks. There were no major events or concerns in the month since the last council meeting. He told the council that there was a male who was trespassed from the ballpark. He is also trespassed from Ney. There have been no issues since.

M. Sudholtz reminded the deputy about the senior parade on May 23rd, the Sher'wing Thing on July 25th, and the Sh'wing the Bat Tournament on August 1st.

J. Hohenberger asked if there were any violations for running the new four-way stop signs, Deputy Jackson said that there have been none that he is aware of and no accidents either. He is aware that there has been an increase in engine brake complaints.

ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

LAND/BUILDINGS

Village Hall

S. Ramey said that she has reached out to Leever Glass a couple of times and still has not heard anything about when they will be coming to install the new windows at the Village Hall. The drop-down ceiling is still getting torn out when the weather calls for inside work.

Welcome to Sherwood Signs

Lights have been installed on the Welcome to Sherwood sign at the North edge of the village. They are installed temporarily to judge how that looks shining up from the ground. There is some backing coming off and she will be getting in touch with Dave Brown to have them repaired.

Library

Buckeye Roofing came to look at the leak in the roof, but it still has not been fixed.

The outside lights have been fixed, and the window vinyl has been installed in the four second story windows. There will be backlighting added to show them off.

Maintenance Garage

S. Ramey said there will be quotes for 275.5 feet of fencing for the west side of the maintenance garage by Moat's Park.

PARKS

Moat's Park

One porta-john has been moved from Little Reservation Station to Moat's. The one at Memorial Park has not been moved yet.

Ball Fields

The games have been going smoothly. There is a tournament scheduled for June 6th and S. Ramey asked for the councilmembers' help with collecting the parking admission fee.

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Defiance Foundation Grant

\$25,000 was received for Moats Park updates. They would like continued updates and possibly another submission in the fall.

Memorial Park

The Brick Fundraiser is underway. There will be fifty bricks available at a cost of \$150 apiece.

EQUIPMENT

A concrete mixing bucket attachment was purchased for the skid steer for \$900.

The Ferris is not running right and was taken to Homier & Sons in Continental on Monday May 18 for repairs.

WATER & SEWER

There were nine shut-off notices in April; two were shut off and turned back on.

S. Ramey stated that she is still waiting for paperwork from the engineer for a water treatment option.

MISCELLANEOUS

The America 250 banners have been hung. The flags from the VFW have been installed downtown by the village with the bucket truck. They needed to be raised higher on the poles as they kept getting hit by trucks. The plan now is to place pins in their brackets to keep the wind from blowing them out.

FINANCIALS

The contract the village has with Metalink has been signed and payment has been made for the use of the new water tower from 2023 to present.

Resolution 24-01-02 ended in February of 2026, so the transfer from March and April were voided.

UPCOMING EVENTS

The Senior Parade is on Saturday, May 23, beginning at Moats Park at 11am.

Monday, May 25th the Memorial Day Parade begins in Ney at 9am and will be in Sherwood at noon for the Memorial Day Service.

The village office will be closed on Monday, May 25th for Memorial Day.

The Food Pantry will be on Friday, May 29th from 8am to 10am.

The Sher'wing Thing will be on Saturday, July 25th and the Sh'wing the Bat Tournament will be on Saturday, August 1st.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

The catch basin at Redline has developed a massive sinkhole after growing a lot larger in just the last month and it may need to be entirely replaced.

There is a property that has a commercial and a residence together on the same lot. The Werlor contract is for residential only. Because it is zoned as commercial, the trash cart will be removed as they are not eligible for trash pickup. R. Valle asked if there was any information for citizens to inform them that if they have a dumpster, it needs to be

enclosed. S. Ramey said there are some issues, one being she does not think the Werlor workers will open the enclosure gates. R. Valle stated that he believes that it should be the responsibility of the owner, just like taking a trash cart to the curb for pickup is the owner’s responsibility.

The village hired a temporary part-time employee. The hiring process was handled by the Employee Committee, J. Hurtig, F. Escalera, and D. Weaner without S. Ramey’s involvement. The job opening is still available and applications will be accepted, but none have been submitted as of yet.

Another donation was received for the Moats Park Project. The biannual event at Crystal Fountain Park for the Born Free Campers was held. There was an auction where everyone brought something to be auctioned. The proceeds of \$1602 went towards the Moats Park Project.

OLD BUSINESS

S. Rohrs heard that there are people in town that are feeding all the neighborhood cats and making homes for them in their yard. He said that with all the issues with cats the village is having, the village should have some sort of recourse to hold them accountable for the spaying and neutering of the animals they are caring for. An exchange about solutions to the problem ensued. Microchipping, licensing, and trap and release programs were mentioned as ideas. Writing letters to state representatives asking for funding and assistance with the plight may be another way to address the issue.

NEW BUSINESS

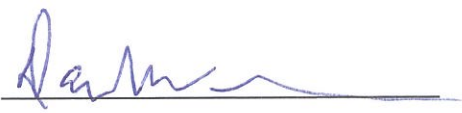
There was an in-depth discussion about a local village’s request for administrative assistance.
